




About CGS International Graduate Admissions Survey

Conducted annually by the Council of Graduate Schools (CGS) since 2004.

- Reports final application counts, numbers of offers of admission, first-time enrollment, and total enrollment of international graduate students for each fall admission cycle.
- The 2020 CGS International Graduate Admissions Survey was sent to 771 U.S. colleges and universities, which were CGS members or were members of CSGS, MAGS, NAGS, or WAGS.
- A total of 360 institutions, or 47% responded to the 2020 survey.







In 2019-2020, there was a 3% increase in international graduate applications, the same increase as between Fall 2018 and Fall 2019.








Application increases were driven by increases at Doctoral Universities.

Applications in Biological & Agricultural Sciences, Mathematics & Computer Sciences and Physical & Earth Sciences continued robust growth.



One-year Change in First-time International Graduate Enrollment, Fall 2015 to Fall 2020








The decline of international first-time graduate enrollment was consistent across institutional types.

One-year Change in First-time International First-time Graduate Enrollment by Degree Objective and Institutional Type between Fall 2019 and Fall 2020








Although the decline in first-time enrollment was substantial, there were also many offers of admissions that have been deferred.






Graduate applications of Chinese nationals and Indian nationals both increased between Fall 2019 and Fall 2020.








Higher number of admissions deferrals by Indian nationals






By region, Asian, Middle East & North Africa, and Sub-Saharan Africa had large shares of deferred offers at both the master's and certificate and the doctoral levels.












A large number of deferred offers across all fields at both the master's and doctoral level

• 80% REPORTED AN INCREASE



Factors Institutions Believe are Associated with Increased International Student Deferrals


