How to Prepare

Episode 3*

- Start at least four months ahead of application deadline
- Budget the necessary time
 - e.g., 5 hrs/wk for final eight weeks
 - You may be busiest during final exams!
- Take the GRE!
 - Many programs have waived or eliminated the requirement
 - Use it to gauge your readiness for grad school and which programs you might be eligible for

- Talk to people you trust
 - Instructors
 - Friends/relatives with advanced degrees
 - People you know currently in grad school

When to Apply

- Usually December/January for following Fall admission
- Earlier for Spring admission (rare for PhD programs)
- Rolling admissions for online programs
- Don't expect leeway with application deadlines

Where to Apply

- Be flexible in matching undergraduate degree to master's program (e.g., interdisciplinary studies, peace and conflict studies, nanotechnology)
- Cost of attendance
- New federal "guidance" requiring employment statistics for program graduates
- Application Costs; fee waivers for NNE, needbased waivers
- Valhalla vs. Rivendell; have a few options
- Dirty Little Secrets: It doesn't matter as much as you think it does

Potential Advisor Inquiries

- Mostly a terminal degree concern; e.g. PhD, MA
- Approach is very discipline specific
 - Do I need a faculty advisor before entering grad school?
- Humanities try to meet people at conferences and events
- STEM fields don't send cold emails
- Ask faculty you know well for recommendations and introductions if appropriate

Letters of Recommendation

- Whom to ask?
 - Faculty; have backups
 - Limit number of letters to < 5 each
- How to ask them?
 - Do it in person!
 - Follow up with a thank you email and details for your letter
- What do they need?
 - Resume/CV
 - Highlight major accomplishments
 - Where you are applying; make connections
- When should I start?
 - Give them plenty of time; 4-6 weeks
 - Try to group automated requests as tightly together as possible
 - Send a gentle email reminder one week before
 - Have an emergency backup; department chairs
- Letters are confidential and submitted via secure link. Don't ask for a copy.
- Dirty Little Secrets: What is generally in them?

Personal Statement/ Statement of Purpose

- Some schools require BOTH Personal Statement and Statement of Purpose
- Read the prompt!
- Tell a story; biographical but not necessarily chronological
- 1-2 pages; no longer
- Address barriers, highlights, and potential red flags (gaps in academic training)
- Personalize it for each institution
- Close with impactful recapitulation
- Don't use Al
- Have someone read it for clarity
- SPELL AND GRAMMAR CHECK!!! (Yes, I'm shouting)
- Answer the question "Why?" (more in a moment ...)

Supplemental Materials

- Submit only what is requested. Portfolios, recordings OK if requested
- Use links in Personal Statement if it's really that important
 - DOI to publications
 - Articles written by others that feature you

Managing Expectations

- These things take time don't harass the admissions office
- Not hearing isn't necessarily a bad thing
- Request a decision if you must, but be prepared for "No"
- Have a plan "B"
 - Work
 - Gap Year
 - Delay graduation
- April 15 deadline for decisions on offers of financial support

Have Your "Why" Ready

- Why do you want an advanced degree?
- Why do you want to attend this program specifically?
- Pursue your passion!

Campus Visits

- Some do this prior to offer of admission = "audition"
- Some do this after admission = "recruitment"
- Some don't do this at all; go anyway
- Budget the necessary time away from classes
